Long-term Memory Knowledge:

The Ancient Maya people lived in modern-day Mexico, Guatemala and Belize around 1000 years ago.

They are considered an advanced society – compared to Britain at a similar time – because of their trading patterns, political life, understanding of astronomy, use of a calendar and mathematics. The Maya religion was polytheistic.

Now	Some of the things the children are familiar with nowadays originated with the Maya, e.g. place value. Children develop an appreciation for past civilisations.
Future	Recognise similarities and differences between different civilisations – either of the same time period or same part of the world. Children see that the past has an impact on the present – our society would not be as it is today without discoveries and inventions from the past.
Aspiration	Develop a passion for the past; travel abroad to study a society in depth to increase our understanding; they may consider a career in historical research or join a local historical society.
