Year 5 What does it mean to be a Muslim? RE



National Curriculum Links:

Make connections between Muslim practice of the Five Pillars and their beliefs about God and the Prophet Muhammed.

Describe and reflect on the significance of the Qur'an to Muslims.

Describe the forms of guidance a Muslim uses and compare them to forms of guidance experienced by the pupils.

Make connections between the key functions of the mosque and the beliefs of Muslims.

Essential Prior Learning:

Islam is one of the world's major religions. Some children in our school are Muslims. Muslims believe in one God, Allah.

Muhammed is the final prophet of Islam.

Progression in Skill:

Make links between Muslim practice of the five pillars and Muslim beliefs about God.

Make links between Muslim practice of each of the five pillars and Muslim beliefs about Prophet Muhammed.

Describe and reflect on how the Qur'an is significant to Muslims.

Describe and reflect on how other forms of guidance, e.g. Hadith are significant to Muslims. Compare, noting similarities and differences, the guidance I use with the guidance used by a Muslim.

Identify and explain connections between the main functions of the Mosque and Muslim beliefs.

Long-term Memory Knowledge:

The Five Pillars of Islam require Muslim to do certain things/behave in a certain way to demonstrate their faith in Allah.

The Qur'an, Sunnah and Hadith provide additional guidance to Muslims as to how to live their lives.

It can be tricky to fulfil these obligations when living in a country where Islam is not the predominant religion.
